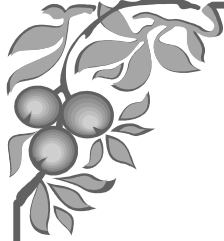

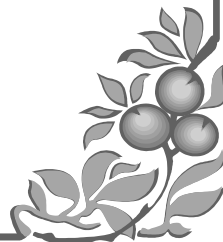

From the Executive Director . . .

As I write this CDLC institutional members number 68, a substantial increase from the 42 members when I became Executive Director in 1998. Many of the newer members have smaller, specialized collections which increase the breadth of the information resources of the region. They joined CDLC because membership offers them continuing education and training opportunities, access to consultation services by CDLC staff, and the chance for interaction with other information professionals. We're glad to have them! Please join me in welcoming the newest CDLC members:

The **Alzheimer's Association of Northeast New York** is one of 80 members of the national Alzheimer's Association. The organization serves 17 counties and provides training and education for caregivers in their service area. Their library collection complements their service, providing books, journals, videos, training programs, and other materials for adults and children that help people understand the disease and help support caregivers.

Archives of the Troy Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church is CDLC's first affiliate member. The Archives includes materials such as clergy files, Troy Conference minutes, historic photos, records from individual churches in the conference, and books related to Methodism. Researchers on the abolitionist movement and genealogists find this collection useful. The affiliate membership category is offered to historical repositories with volunteer staff and newly created libraries still developing collection and service structure.

Mildred Elley offers six Associate in Occupational Studies degree programs, eight certificate programs, and a diploma program. The college was founded in 1917 to train young women in office skills but over the years has broadened its focus. Currently located in Latham, Mildred Elley will be moving to new facilities in Schenectady in two years. The student body varies in age, with some coming from high school and other older students upgrading skills or returning to the work force. Online resources are very important to this library, though the library also includes a small collection of core books for their disciplines.

Within this report you will find information about the wide variety of programs and activities we have been involved in during the year. Our programs are overseen by a 15 member Board of Trustees, which sets our direction and focus. Peter Koonz, Library Director at The College of Saint Rose, is finishing his term of service and leaving the board. We offer a special thanks to Pete for working with us for the past five years.

It would not be possible to talk about this year without noting the profound effect of the passing of two people who were so central to Council programs for many years. Carol Lagasse began work on the union catalog project in 1988. In that capacity she probably knew the libraries of the region better than anyone else because she collected catalog records, created codes, and merged data into the CD-ROM-based CaDiLaC and then CaDiLaC Online. Charles Custer, who died in January shortly after Carol, was the first director of the CDLC. Charles served as Executive Director from 1968 until his retirement in 1998, and in that capacity he led the development of the regional library programs we all take for granted today. After his retirement he remained very supportive of Council activities and staff. All of us at CDLC are grateful for the understanding and support shown by our members and friends as we adjusted to life without these colleagues and friends. Proceeds of this year's basket raffle and silent auction will go into the memorial funds which the Trustees have established for Charles and Carol. The funds will be used to develop a new training facility in memory of Carol and for establishment of "The Custer Center" in our offices.

Programs and Services



Documentary Heritage Program

The Documentary Heritage Program (DHP) serves any non-profit organization in the region holding records that may be historically valuable. The program also helps institutions and organizations to identify important historical records in both public and private hands and make those records more accessible to the public. There are over 200 organizations and institutions in CDLC's region that are eligible for DHP services.

This year the Regional Archivist had the opportunity to work directly with a huge variety of organizations, everything from the Adirondack Research Library to the Troy Conference of the United Methodist Church. In all, she made 10 site visits and responded to over 275 inquiries. The program also sponsored three workshops.

The DHP was the lucky recipient of the \$1,000 Academic and Special Libraries/Ridley's Book Bindery Student Internship Grant. Through this grant we have hired Sean Heather McGraw of University at Albany as an intern. She is working on a project to develop guidelines for archivists to assist them in meeting the needs of K-12 teachers. Traditionally, this has been a difficult area for archivists, and several archivists nationwide have asked to see the results when the project is complete.



Hospital Library Service Program

During the 2005/2006 HLSP program year, the HLSP Coordinator performed 28 site visits to program member libraries to give aid and consultation. The Coordinator is now doing the copy cataloging for HLSP member libraries. The Coordinator also conducted 157 program contacts by phone and 380 program contacts by e-mail, and produced 3 program newsletters. The Hospital Library Service Program sponsored six continuing education events:

- ◆ “MeSH From the Ground Up” MLA CE class (attended by 9 CDLC academic, health, public and special library staff - April 2005).
- ◆ “Introduction to Financial Management for Health Sciences Librarians” MLA CE class (attended by 8 CDLC and 8 non-CDLC academic, health, public and special library staff - November 2005).
- ◆ “Getting Started with Linkout” class (attended by 5 CDLC academic, health and special library staff - January 2006), joint HLSP/MISP sponsorship.
- ◆ Two meetings of the HLSP Searching Club (July 2005 - Seton Health, 3 attendees; April 2006 - St. Peter's Hospital, 4 attendees).
- ◆ “Proving Your Worth” MLA CE class scheduled for June 2006, joint HLSP/MISP sponsorship.

The Hospital Library Service Program provided \$35,477 in grant funding for its member libraries to buy needed materials such as books, online and print journals, and database access, as well as equipment such as fax machines and computers. HLSP grant funding provided a consortial subscription for program member hospitals to the Ovid LWW collection of 140 full text online health and medical journals until January 1, 2006. HLSP grant funding has also provided a consortial subscription for program member hospitals to the Doody's Core Titles in the Health Sciences 2005 online, providing recommendations and reviews for library materials purchases in 121 specialties in the health sciences. The program purchased 2 new videos on Healthcare Compliance and Patient Diversity and acquired another video on Ethics in Biomedical Research for free.

Programs and Services



Medical Information Services Program

CDLC's Medical Information Services Program (MISP) is part of a state-wide program funded by New York State to provide New York State residents with improved access to current, up-to-date medical information. This includes both healthcare consumers and the clinicians who will provide their healthcare.

During the 05/06 MISP year, \$21,411 was distributed to CDLC area libraries to help pay for health information obtained for their patrons through interlibrary loans. \$10,654 of this total was directly distributed into the Electronic Funds Transfer System accounts of 9 of the member libraries. The member libraries reported using \$18,849 for their loans for the 04/05 year. These were for the most part performed through the National Network of Libraries of Medicine at a rate of \$11 for a basic loan request. \$10,000 was distributed to Albany Medical College to help offset their expense for providing medical information, including, but not limited to, local interlibrary loans to CDLC member libraries. \$85 was saved for CDLC to use to provide health information related interlibrary loan service to its member libraries. \$1,658 was retained by CDLC to help pay for health information related continuing education including:

- ◆ “Getting Started with Linkout” class (attended by 5 CDLC academic, health and special library staff) in January 2006, joint HLSP/MISP sponsorship.
- ◆ “Proving Your Worth” MLA CE class scheduled for June 2006, joint HLSP/MISP sponsorship.



Communications

CDLC maintains communication with its members in a variety of ways. Information about programs, events, and services frequently is sent out to the many email lists that CDLC has created. At times we experience the inevitable “cross-posting” because some people are on several lists, but using the lists still remains an efficient way of disseminating information.

The CDLC website also is an effective means of providing CDLC information for our members. The home page of the website changes on a regular basis as news and upcoming events are announced. CaDiLaC Online is the most heavily visited page on the site with an average of more than 12,000 hits per month over the last year! The Jobs page of the website, maintained by Jack Beadle, continues to be the next most visited page. According to our web server statistics, other often visited sections (in order of frequency) include Programs and Services, About CDLC, Member Libraries, Resource Sharing, Useful Links, and Advocacy. Information about CDLC programs and services is easily accessible, and the calendar provides event and meeting information including links to event locations, maps and driving directions.

ReCap, the CDLC Newsletter, was published twice in the past year. ReCap is mailed to personal members, directors of all member libraries, and school libraries (during the school year) and is also available for viewing on the website (http://www.cdlic.org/About_CDLC/newsletter.shtml).



Consortial Purchasing

Consortial buying opportunities for electronic databases are available for CDLC institutional members through WALDO (Westchester Academic Library Directors Organization), Nylink and Britannica Online. Discounts to libraries buying products through this process provide substantial savings - in some cases perhaps as much as 50%. In 2005-2006 sixteen CDLC libraries purchased 250 database subscriptions totaling nearly \$725,000!

Programs and Services



Continuing Education

Funding from participant registration fees, the Regional Bibliographic Databases Program (RBDB) and from the proceeds of CDLC's 2005 Basket Raffle provided several excellent programs this year.

- ◆ December - CDLC co-sponsored an Emerging Technologies Conference with the Washington-Saratoga-Warren-Hamilton-Essex BOCES School Library System. David Warlick, director of The Landmark Project, a web development, consulting, and innovations firm in North Carolina, gave the keynote address "Riding the Edge of the Wave: Breakthrough Technologies, Breakthrough Schools." Other presentations of the conference included "Blogs, Wikis & Podcasting: Student Journalists & Information Masters," "CyberSmart K-8 Curriculum & Pathways to Information Fluency," "Teacher's Guide to RSS," and "Mozilla Firefox . . .What's THAT?!?"
- ◆ January - "The Basics of Selling on eBay" was presented by Denise Coblisch, an Education Specialist trained by eBay. The instructor showed participants how to open a Seller Account, do research and create listings, improve listings with better descriptions and photography, set pricing, monitor listings, and complete transactions.
- ◆ March - Karen E. K. Brown, Preservation Librarian, University at Albany, presented "Emergency Preparedness, Prevention & Response: An Introduction for Libraries and Archives." The program included: what is a disaster; disaster planning - the elements of a plan and identifying risks; prevention; and response and recovery. This workshop was planned in response to a need presented by a member of CDLC's COIL committee following the Hurricane Katrina disaster.
- ◆ April - "Crossing the Chasm: From Cutting Edge to Practical Application" was the Emerging Technologies program presented by Stephanie Willen Brown, Electronic Resources Librarian, University of Connecticut and Adjunct Faculty, Graduate School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College. The presentation was appropriate for all library types and focused on: trends & buzzwords, blogging, RSS, wikis, and information overload.
- ◆ May - "Creative Uses of PowerPoint" was presented by MicroKnowledge, Inc. to participants from the Questar III School Library System.

In addition to continuing education training classes, CDLC sponsored several vendor sessions throughout the year including the annual WALDO database update and a Chemical Abstracts Service STN® Patent Forum session.

Many of CDLC's specific programs and services also hosted continuing education programs, workshops and presentations. Details of these events can be found within this report.

For the first time in many years CDLC did not receive any LSTA funding, which had in the past supported technology training including our discounted training coupon opportunities. The LSTA program is now on a two-year cycle and the next opportunity for submitting a grant application will be for the 2007-2009 program.



Cooperative Cataloging

The Cooperative Cataloging Program of CDLC helps to increase the number of bibliographic resources available electronically to the region by offering cost-effective cataloging services to member libraries. Cataloging services are available to any CDLC member library, for any type of material. During the 2005-2006 program year 25 members took advantage of this program. In addition, CDLC provided cataloging for 24 schools in the Hamilton-Fulton-Montgomery School Library System and 18 schools in Questar III.

New members this year to the cataloging program are the NYS Military Museum and the Alzheimer's Association. Cataloging is done on the OCLC database and is added directly into CDLC's Partial Union Catalog (PUC). This enables the cataloging records to display in CaDiLaC Online immediately.

Through the end of April, there have been 6,426 titles cataloged for member libraries and schools. This represents an increase of 2,515 titles over last year's cataloging activity! Included in this figure are 118 original cataloging records. We also processed 798 deletions from our catalog.

In addition to our current cataloging, we also loaded approximately 16,000 titles from Columbia High School into the PUC during this program year. This was our first step in gaining access to library collections that have previously not been available in CaDiLaC Online.

Coordinated Collection Development

In the 2005-2006 program year the New York State Coordinated Collection Development Aid program, administered at the local level by the 3Rs Councils, provided materials funding to 21 of CDLC's public or nonprofit independent colleges and universities. For the first time the application process was done online. There were, of course, a few glitches as with any new approach, but overall the application process was improved and institutions received the grant money more quickly. Each participating library uses the funds to purchase materials in a specific subject area (see the list at http://www.cdlc.org/Programs_And_Services/ccd/ccdsub.shtml). The materials are then available for resource sharing throughout the region and the state. A total of \$163,588 was distributed as follows:

Courier Delivery

This was the first full year for the regional courier service in which CDLC participates with the Mohawk Valley, Southern Adirondack, and Upper Hudson Library Systems. Service is provided by CD&L out of facilities in Albany. Nine different routes provide deliveries to 130 regional libraries and system offices. Connections to the school library systems mean that materials can reach any of the 500+ schools in the region. Thirty nine of CDLC's members participate in the delivery service, receiving from one to five stops per week, and CDLC has arranged for five stops per week at the New York State Library. Senator Hugh Farley and Assemblywoman Teresa Sayward provided member library grants to support costs related to the start-up of the delivery service.

Not surprisingly, the new delivery service presented some challenges as drivers and sorters learned about libraries, and libraries learned to work with the new guidelines to assure that the thousands of items carried each day reach their destinations safely. We hope that the lessons learned will help us to continue to develop this important service in the coming years.

Programs and Services



Direct Access Program

CDLC's Direct Access Program (DAP) allows cardholders to borrow materials directly from all participating libraries. The Direct Access Program continues to run smoothly and is used extensively by members of the library community. The program includes a total of 63 academic, special and public libraries. Participation in DAP is open to all member libraries, library systems, and individual public libraries in the CDLC region. Individuals may participate in the program by applying for a DAP borrower's card from their home library.



Regional Automation Activities

The Regional Automation Advisory Committee (RAAC) is responsible for developing and planning the programs to be funded by New York State's Regional Bibliographic Data Bases (RBDB) program. RAAC has 18 members representing academic, public, special, and school libraries; the public and school library systems; and the research community. Several CDLC staff are *ex officio* members of the committee. This year the following projects were included in the RBDB program:

- ◆ CaDiLaC Online: Z39.50 access to 22 member catalogs, the Partial Union Catalog (see below), and the New York State Library. CaDiLaC Online is accessible through the CDLC website and provides easy searching of multiple catalogs. Most catalogs provide circulation status. The catalog of Emma Willard School was added this year and we expect the Capital Region BOCES SLS to be available soon.
- ◆ Partial Union Catalog (PUC): The PUC includes about 400,000 bibliographic records from academic, special, and school libraries. These libraries may not have electronic catalogs, or security concerns may preclude their catalogs being searched by CaDiLaC Online software. The PUC is one of the catalogs available on CaDiLaC Online.
- ◆ Union List of Serials (ULS): The ULS includes more than 37,000 titles and almost 84,000 holdings from 534 libraries in the region. The ULS is accessible through CaDiLaC Online and OCLC.
- ◆ Retrospective Conversion: Grants were provided to 12 libraries to assist with converting catalog records to machine readable format. The following libraries received funding: Albany Institute of History & Art, The College of St. Rose, Crandall Public Library (Glens Falls), Hebrew Academy of the Capital District, Martin Van Buren Elementary (Ichabod Crane Schools), Montgomery C. Smith Middle School (Hudson City Schools), NYS Military Museum, NYS Department of Environmental Conservation, Sage Colleges, Schenectady County Historical Society, Ballard Elementary School (South Glens Falls School District), and Moreau Elementary School (South Glens Falls School District).
- ◆ ILLiad Consortium: To enhance resource sharing in the region, RBDB provided support for a group of academic libraries using the ILLiad software. Sage Colleges hosted the server, which was purchased through RBDB funding, and Sage Colleges staff provided management and support. Participants included: Albany Law School, Albany Medical College, Fulton-Montgomery Community College, Sage Colleges, Schenectady County Community College, SUNY Cobleskill, The College of Saint Rose, and Union College. The group held a users group meeting in January.
- ◆ OCLC Selective User Support: RBDB supported this region's OCLC "interlibrary-loan-only" libraries by providing partial funding for interlibrary loan costs. 20 libraries (academic, public, hospital, school, and special) and 3 library systems (public and school) received funding from this program.

- ◆ Emerging Technologies Programming: CDLC co-sponsored a December 2005 Emerging Technologies Conference (see page 5) with WSWHE and presented “Crossing the Chasm: From Cutting Edge to Practical Application” by Stephanie Willen Brown in April 2006.
- ◆ Technology Training: Coupons for technology training at Microknowledge were made available to member libraries.
- ◆ Digitization Program: The digitization program is slowly moving ahead with scheduling for a series of training sessions underway. The goal for the project is better understanding of digitization issues as well as a region-wide digitization project for libraries that wish to participate.

Resource Sharing

The Bibliographic Center processed a total of 1,062 requests during the past year. Processing of these requests involved searching CaDiLaC Online (980 searches), WorldCat (270 searches) and the CDLC Union Catalog of Monographs (249 searches). For those requests without CDLC locations, the Bib Center referred 243 requests via the OCLC/ILL subsystem, 48 requests to the New York State Library via NYSILL and 14 requests via Docline. Additional verification and location information was provided using the following sources:

CDLC provided support for member libraries using OCLC interlibrary loan as selective users, offering updates to groups and individuals as OCLC migrated all interlibrary loan users to the FirstSearch Resource Sharing platform. CDLC continued to act as billing agent for the ILL only users and to provide training and support.

COIL: The Committee on Interlibrary Loan sponsored a third Interlibrary Loan Field Day, held at Hudson Valley Community College on May 17, 2006. Topics for the Interlibrary Loan Field Day III included copyright issues for libraries, Docline, FirstSearch Resource Sharing and ILL basics. Focus for the Field Day resulted from the series of discussion groups held in the spring of 2005 and from comments received at the Interlibrary Loan Field Day II.

Union List of Serials: Maintenance continued on the Union List of Serials. New data on Union List holdings was generated from OCLC and added to CaDiLaC Online in June 2005 and December 2005. Updates included the following:

In February, OCLC migrated the Union Listing service to the Connexion platform and implemented the MARC 21 Format for Holdings. The MARC 21 format will allow for greater detail in holdings information and better communication across systems.

Student Employee Award

CDLC sponsors an annual award for student employees in libraries. The purpose of this award is to reward excellence among young library workers, both to exemplify the high standards sought in library staff and to encourage investigation of librarianship as a career goal. Winners receive a certificate and token prizes, along with the recognition of their supervisors and peers that their work has been exemplary.

The 2006 Outstanding Student Employee Award was presented to 15 students at a ceremony held at CDLC on April 11, 2006. Kingsley Greene, Director of Libraries at Sage Colleges and President of CDLC's Board of Trustees, served as Master of Ceremonies for the event. Dr. Peter Bloniarz, Associate Professor for Informatics and Dean, College of Computing and Information, University at Albany, spoke to the students, their families and supervisors. Dr. Bloniarz congratulated the students for this honor and noted that their hard work was appreciated and their recognition well-deserved.

Resource Development Committee

Late in 2004 CDLC's newly formed Resource Development Committee began meeting with the goal of promotion of CDLC programs and increasing funding for those programs.

Discussions in committee meetings have been valuable and many ideas have been considered. The most obviously successful project has been the CDLC Basket Raffle. We have had a tremendous and generous response from donors - vendors, suppliers, and individuals alike. The 2005 raffle raised nearly \$4,000 which has been used to support this year's continuing education events and expenses. In response to requests from donors and participants we are actively involved in the 2006 Basket Raffle. An added event this year is the first CDLC Silent Auction, with five donated items on the ticket.

The proposal to create the CDLC Retired Librarians Group (see page 11) came from the Resource Development Committee. This idea was met with enthusiastic response from our area retirees, so it is obvious that it was an idea that was timely and appropriate.

Other projects that have been discussed by the committee include a CDLC Friends Group, sponsored bus trips, sponsorship of the CDLC courier totes, member item grants, a campaign to fund renovation of CDLC offices, benefits of CDLC personal membership, corporate membership, and CDLC's participation in the Tech Valley initiatives.

Topics and speakers included: “Blogs and RSS” presented by Laura Cohen, Library Web Administrator, University Libraries, University at Albany; “Virtual Reference” presented by Mary Anne Waltz, Coordinator of Reference & Instructional Services, Folsom Library, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute; and “Introduction to Microsoft Publisher” presented by Polly-Alida Farrington, PA Farrington Associates.
- ◆ April 2006 - Annual Spring Workshop at the CDLC headquarters entitled "The New York State Library and You" with guest speaker Mary Woodward, Senior Librarian from the Research Library Information and Outreach section. Ms. Woodward spoke on the history of the New York State Library and its collections. She also demonstrated how to use the NOVEL database that is supplied by the State Library. The 16 workshop attendees were invited to sign up for New York State Library cards that are now available to residents of New York State.

The Capital District Business Librarians (CDBL) group, established to improve library services to business by creating opportunities to keep librarians informed about sources of information, has been a CDLC Membership Group since 1992. - ◆ July 2005 - Workshop on the 2002 Economic Census led by Dr. Leonard Gaines, Program Research Specialist with the New York State Department of Economic Development's Division of Policy and Research.
- ◆ September 2005 - 10th annual CDBL breakfast meeting held at the Siena College campus where speaker Laura B. Cohen, Library Web Administrator at SUNY Albany, presented a program titled “The ABC's of RSS and Blogging for Beginners.”
- ◆ November 2005 - “The Upstate New York Economy – Research from the Fed,” was held at the William K. Sanford Town Library in Colonie. Richard Deitz, Senior Economist with the Buffalo Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, spoke about the economic challenges facing the Upstate New York region and identified numerous information sources for basic regional economic indicators such as employment, population and consumer confidence. The meeting was attended by area librarians from academia, the private sector, and some state agencies.
- ◆ March 2006 - the CDBL Spring meeting at the William K. Sanford Town Library featured Gerald Shaye, the Director of International Trade Development at NYS Empire State Development, presenting “Going Global: International Trade Resources.” The presentation began with a discussion of international trade and, in

Subjects of particular interest addressed included movement of the Federal Depository Library Program to an online collection, definition and retention of Federal core titles to be recommended for dissemination in paper copy, increasingly limited access to Federal materials that are being reclassified or that are not being declassified according to expected schedules, and providing access to Federal and State information and service to our patrons.
